Grown Up Guide

This booklet is designed to help children picture ADHD not as a label, but as a buddy who lives alongside them. It encourages kids to imagine how they and their 'Buddy' share everyday life, with its quirks, strengths and challenges.

As a parent, carer or teacher, you can use it as:

A conversation starter - opening gentle discussions about what ADHD means to your ahild.

A reflection tool - helping them describe how their 'Buddy' shows up in daily life.

A bridge for others - supporting classmates, siblings or friends to better understand.

The booklet is deliberately simple, visual and flexible. Some children may enjoy colouring or doodling in it, while others may prefer just talking through the pages.

There's no right or wrong way to use it.

Above all, it's about giving children permission to see ADHD as part of who they are, without judgment, and to explore ways to live confidently side by side with their buddy.

Meet ADHD

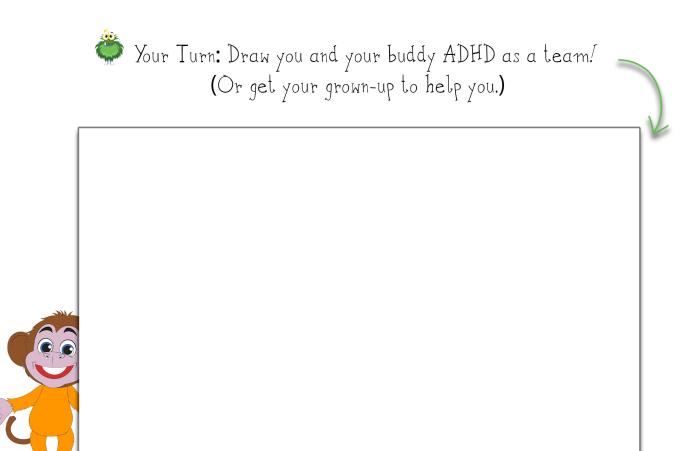
ADHD is like a buddy who came to live with me.

a space monkey dressed in orange, or something only you can imagine.

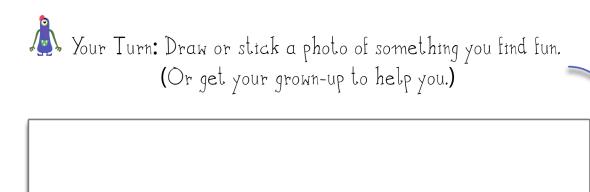
The Fun Stuff

Is it jumping up and down or running really fast?

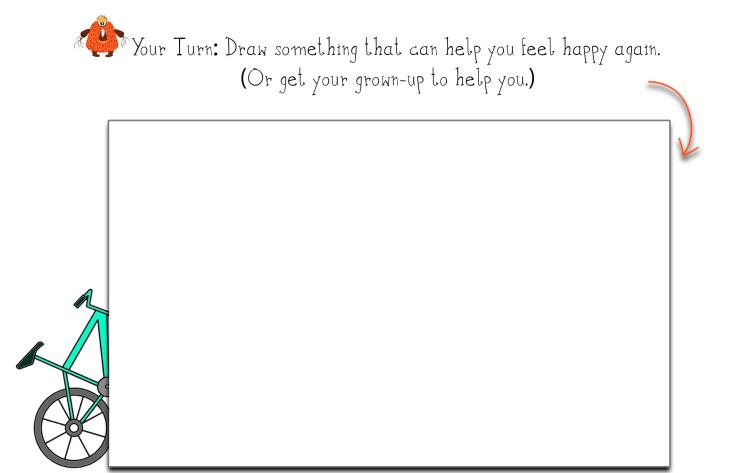
Could it be building tents, or making bubble volcanos in the bath?

Or maybe a run around the park, or a ride on your bike?

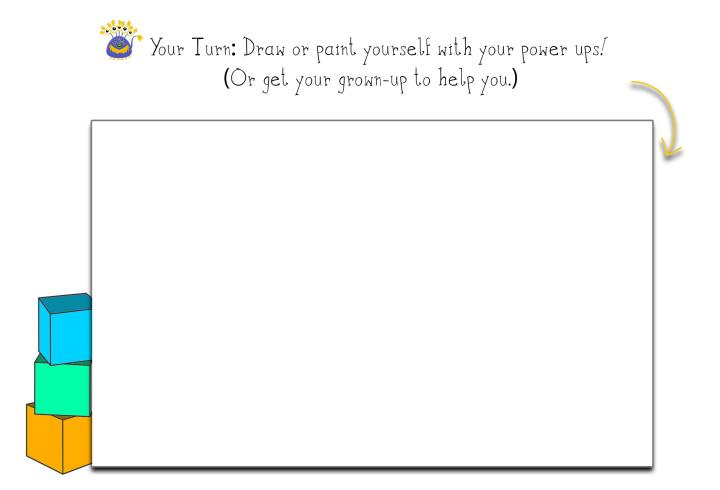


My Power Ups

Or having bursts of energy that help me get things done quickly, which can be really helpful!

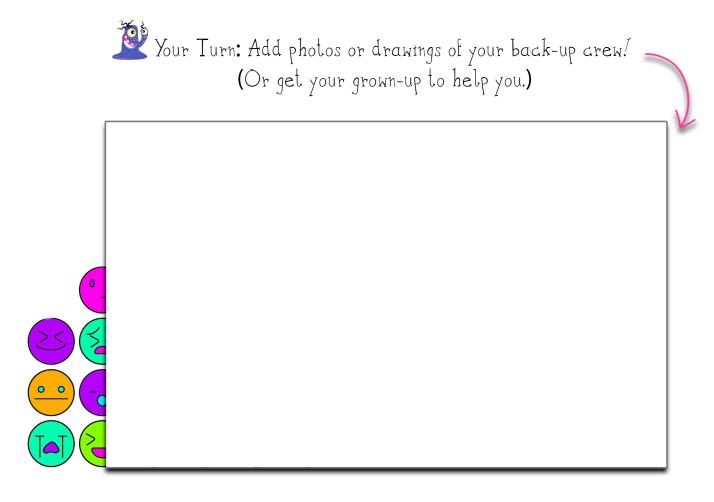


If you needed to carry your power ups around, what would you put them in? Would it be a cool bag, or a box? Or maybe a wheelbarrow with lights?

Sometimes my arew helps me calm the big feelings down. Sometimes they help me laugh when I need it most. And sometimes they sit with me while I figure things out.



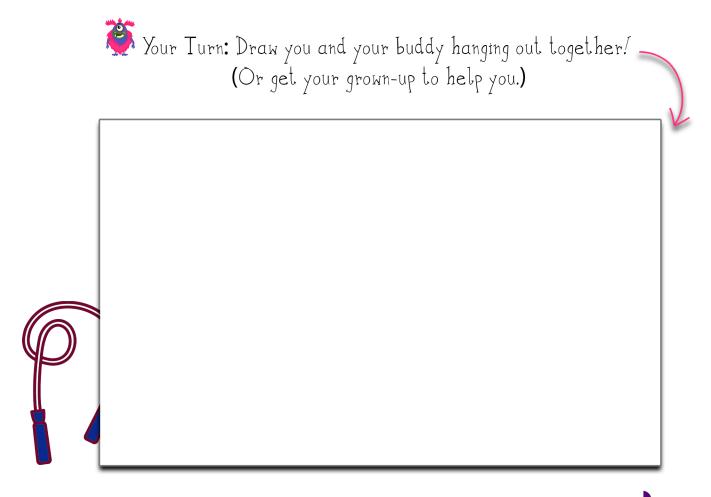
Piak 1 or 2 people from your back-up arew and add their name next to their piature, Add googly eyes, or giant shoes for fun!
